

SAVE THE DATE: November 17th for SCOSA'S Annual Hesburgh Lecture and Panel



4:30pm - 5:45pm, Stockton University Campus Center Theatre

This year's Hesburgh Lecture offered by SCOSA in collaboration with the Notre Dame Club of South Jersey and the University of Notre Dame Alumni Association will feature Dr. Kwan S. Kim, Ph.D. Professor Emeritus of Economics; Fellow, Kellogg Institute for International Studies and Liu Institute for Asian Studies, all at Notre Dame. Dr. Kim will speak on "The Global Poverty Gap and World Hunger".

After taking a fresh look at the magnitude of global poverty,

Dr. Kim's lecture identifies the domestic and global sources of vulnerability facing the poor, and explores the local, national, and global actions needed to end extreme poverty and hunger in the context of social justice.

The lecture is offered as part International Education Week, sponsored by Stockton's Office of Global Engagement, and will be followed by a panel discussion chaired by Dr. Michael Rodriguez, Associate Professor of Political Science and Director of the Washington Internship Program at Stockton University, and featuring Dr. Scott Aughenbaugh, Deputy Director of Strategic Futures at the Center for Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), and Eddie Wright, Communications Specialist for the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA). Hesburgh Lectures, begun in 1986 honor the memory of and perpetuate the example of President Emeritus Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh, C.S.C., as a lifelong learner. Father Ted died in February at age 97; his remarkable career included 35 years as president of Notre Dame, prominent appointments under several U.S. presidents, and receipt of over 150 honorary degrees and the 2000 Congressional Gold Medal.
