EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Stockton Polling Institute in the William J. Hughes Center for Public Policy at The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey conducted telephone interviews of parents of high school students throughout the eight southern New Jersey counties and additionally in Atlantic County alone. Phone calls were made by live interviewers from the Stockton College campus from May 9 to May 23, 2013. Parents were asked about their opinions on potential impacts if Stockton College were to become a university.

Data were collected in two regions: South Jersey including the counties of Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Ocean, and Salem (810 completed interviews); and in Atlantic County alone (612 additional completed interviews.

The surveys find mostly positive feelings connected to the possibility of Stockton College becoming a university, and there is overwhelming support for the concept. Results include the following:

- Overwhelming majorities say university status would enhance Stockton's reputation in the southern New Jersey region and throughout the state;
- About half believe university status would help Stockton graduates find better jobs;
- A significant percentage think that Stockton becoming a university would encourage employers to move into the surrounding region;
- The vast majority believe that university status would enhance the value of a degree from Stockton;
- Overwhelming majorities support the idea of Stockton College becoming a university;
- Majorities believe university status would result in larger class sizes at both the undergraduate and graduate levels;
- And for most parents, university status would not make it more likely that their children would apply to Stockton College.

The sampling margin of error is +/- 3.4 percentage points in the South Jersey survey and +/- 3.95 percentage points in the Atlantic County survey.

METHODOLOGY

More than 1,400 adult parents of high school students in southern New Jersey were interviewed by the Stockton Polling Institute for a survey about attitudes toward The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey potentially becoming a university. Results from two regions were compiled: Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Ocean, and Salem counties; and Atlantic County only. In South Jersey, 810 interviews were completed. The sampling margin of error is +/- 3.4 percentage points. In Atlantic County, an additional 612 interviews were completed. That poll has a margin of error of +/- 3.95 percentage points.

Interviews are conducted at the Stockton Polling Institute by live interviewers calling from the Stockton College campus. The poll was conducted from May 9-23, 2013. Interviewers called both land lines and cell phones. All prospective respondent households in the source telephone list have the same chance of joining the sample because of the random digital dialing system (RDD). Data are weighted according to United States Census Bureau demographics for the southern New Jersey adult population.

Telephone survey of parents of children in high school

The Stockton Polling Institute surveyed 1,422 southern New Jersey and Atlantic County adult residents. Results are reported by: South Jersey region including Atlantic, Burlington, Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Gloucester, Ocean and Salem counties (810 completed interviews); and Atlantic County only (612 additional completed interviews)

Interviews were conducted by the Stockton Polling Institute from the Stockton College campus May 9-23, 2013. Both landlines and cell phones were called. All numbers in this report represent percentages based on weighted frequencies. Margin of error is +/- 3.4 percentage points in South Jersey, +/- 3.95 percentage points in Atlantic County.

In the charts, "DK" means "Not sure/don't know"

Q1. Do you think that becoming a university would enhance Stockton's reputation throughout southern New Jersey?

Parents of high school students think that becoming a university would enhance Stockton College's reputation in southern New Jersey by overwhelming margins. Majorities of 83 percent or more hold up in both the South Jersey and Atlantic County target populations. Region wide, 9 percent in South Jersey are unsure as to whether university status would enhance Stockton's reputation, and 6 percent in Atlantic County are uncertain.

Q2. Do you think that becoming a university would enhance Stockton's reputation throughout the state?

Similar high margins of at least 85 percent in South Jersey and in Atlantic County think that becoming a university would enhance Stockton's reputation throughout all of New Jersey. Less than 10 percent of respondents think such a change would not help the college's reputation. Seven percent in South Jersey are unsure, with 4 percent in Atlantic County not sure.

A plurality of 46 percent in both populations says there is no difference in academic quality between a public college and a public university. However, among those who think that there is a difference, respondents believe that a public university provides greater academic quality than a public college does by a margin of about 20 to 1. Nine percent say they do not know which provides greater quality.

Q4. Would your child be more likely or less likely to apply to Stockton College if it were a university, or would it not make any difference?

The vast majority of parents -73 percent in South Jersey, 68 percent in Atlantic County - say university status would not make a difference in whether or not their children apply to Stockton College. Among parents who say it would make a difference, becoming a university would make it more likely that their children apply by a margin of roughly 10 to 1.

Majorities of 55 percent in South Jersey and 66 percent (nearly two-thirds) in Atlantic County think that becoming a university would result in larger undergraduate class sizes at Stockton. Few think it would result in smaller class sizes. In South Jersey, 30 percent say it would not make a difference, while 24 percent in Atlantic County think there would be no difference. Between 8-9 percent are unsure.

Even higher percentages of parents think that becoming a university would result in larger class sizes at the graduate level. In South Jersey, 62 percent say class size would increase, while 70 percent in Atlantic County say it would. Minorities of 27 percent region wide and 20 percent on Stockton's home county think there would be no difference, while 7 percent in both populations are unsure.

Q7. Do you think Stockton graduates would find better jobs if the college becomes a university?

About half of all respondents – 51 percent in South Jersey, 48 percent in Atlantic County – think university status would help Stockton graduates find better jobs. A little more than one in three think it would not help in finding better jobs. Significant percentages of 13 percent in South Jersey and 18 percent in Atlantic County are not sure.

Half of parents surveyed in Atlantic County think that Stockton becoming a university would encourage more employers to relocate to the region, while only 9 percent think that scenario would be somewhat or very unlikely. In South Jersey, 43 percent think it is very likely or somewhat likely that employers would move into the region, with 44 percent saying it would make no difference. Thirty-six percent in Atlantic County say university status would not make a difference in bringing more employers to the area.

By strong majorities of 70 percent or more, parents think that becoming a university would make a degree from Stockton College more valuable. Less than 1 percent thinks university status would make a Stockton degree less valuable. Approximately one in four in both populations thinks there would be no difference.

Strong majorities support Stockton College becoming a university. Four out of five in Atlantic County support such a change, as do three out of four across the southern region. Minorities of only 5-6 percent oppose Stockton becoming a university. About 20 percent in South Jersey either have no feeling about the proposal or are unsure, with 12 percent in Atlantic County having no feeling or being unsure.


Q3. Which do you think provides greater academic quality?







Q4. Would your child be more likely or less likely to apply to Stockton College if it were a university?







Q5. If Stockton College were to become a university, what do you think the impact would be on the size of undergraduate classes?







Q6. If Stockton were to become a university, what do you think the impact would be on the size of graduate classes?







Q7. Do you think Stockton graduates would find better jobs if the college becomes a university?












