

The Jewish Foundation for the Righteous – "Shining a Light on the Human Spirit in the News from Ukraine" Updates and inspiring stories of rescue and resistance in Ukraine now and in the past. The information presented can assist educators in developing lesson plans appropriate for classroom use, grades 4-12, about the power of how one person can make a difference.

Robert "Bob" Holden, author of Visas to Shanghai: The Story of Feng-Shan Ho

Bob Holden, a retired educator, wrote the book, *Visas to Shanghai: The Story of Feng-Shan Ho*. The book focuses on the successful rescue efforts of Feng-Shan Ho who was the Chinese Consul-General in Vienna during the Holocaust. The book is appropriate for use in grades 4-12, and will be distributed to each educator participant, funded by Maddy & Harvey Rovinsky, "Adopt A Classroom Project."

Betty Grebenschikoff, Holocaust survivor and author of Once My Name Was Sara.

Betty Grebenschikoff was a witness in Berlin, Germany to *Kristallnacht* on November 9-10, 1938. Soon after, Betty and her family escaped to Shanghai, China. Each educator participant will receive the memoir, *Once My Name Was Sara*, funded by Maddy & Harvey Rovinsky, "Adopt A Classroom Project."
