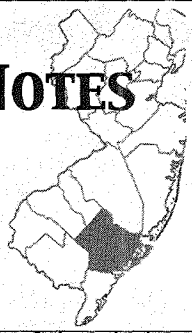
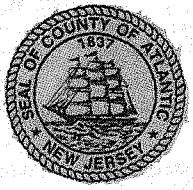

NEW TUITION RATES are being discussed at Richard Stockton College of New Jersey. The college is exploring options for setting tuition rates that administrators expect will maintain Stockton as one of the most affordable and accessible colleges in the state. Given the circumstances, the College administration is preparing budget scenarios based on 3 percent, 5 percent, and 7 percent tuition increases. The final decision on tuition increase will be made during the Board of Trustees' July meeting when the state budget should be finalized and when questions regarding federal economic stimulus funding for the state colleges and universities will be determined.

The College budget has been reduced by \$5,498,363, or roughly five percent in direct cuts and in unfunded mandates. This 5 percent cut in appropriation equals \$1.2 million. The college has also cut its own operating costs, including \$1.75 million in the Administration and Finance budget.

THE 29TH ANNUAL Stockton College Scholarship Benefit Gala, held Saturday April 25 at Caesars Atlantic City, reached its ambitious \$750,000 goal in the face of the most challenging economic climate in event history. More

than 800 people attended the Gala, enjoying a cocktail hour, gourmet dinner, silent auction and concert by legendary entertainer Art Garfunkel. Proceeds of the event benefit student scholarships that award academic excellence and help to maintain college affordability.
