Polling Institute

The Stockton Polling Institute at the Hughes Center is run by Research Director, **Alyssa Maurice**. We released five statewide poll reports on various timely topics, including the economy, immigration, abortion, offshore wind, trust in elections and other institutions, as well as candidate favorability ratings for major races in New Jersey.

In the News

Since June, the Stockton Polling Institute and Hughes Center appeared in the news in print, television, and radio approximately 600 times. Both Research Director **Alyssa Maurice** and Hughes Center Director **Dr. Tina Zappile** shared polling results, insights on current events, and their expertise in national news outlets such as the Associated Press, ABC World News, Politico, NBC, regional media throughout the U.S., including in Philadelphia - 6ABC, CBS3, and WHYY, Baltimore, Boston, Dallas-Ft. Worth, Miami, Maine, North Dakota, and more locally in the New Jersey Globe, Star-Ledger and NJ.com, Atlantic City Press, WKXW (NJ 101.5 FM), and more. Globally, we appeared in the news in Australia, France, Germany, India, Netherlands, Spain, and the United Kingdom.

Listen to our New Podcast!

This fall, the Hughes Center for Public Policy launched its official podcast series, Hughes Center Conversations. Hosted by **Alyssa Maurice**, the podcast provides a platform for exploring pressing issues shaping New Jersey and beyond. Four episodes were released, with special guest speakers offering expert analysis and real-world perspectives. Stockton University's **Dr. Ramya Vijaya**, Professor of Economics, is featured on an episode discussing the impact of immigrant labor on the state's economy, highlighting the challenges and contributions of immigrant workers. Professor of Sustainability **Dr. Patrick Hossay** explores the principles of offshore wind energy, such as turbine mechanics, potential economic benefits, and New Jersey's legislative obstacles. Peter Baker's episode shares insights into his career and experiences as the White House correspondent for The New York Times, highlighting the importance of truth in reporting, the difficulties of covering




presidential administrations, and the evolution of political media. The most recent episode features Atlantic County Clerk **Joe Giralo** and Board of Elections Commissioner **Creed Pogue** to discuss growing skepticism around election results and solutions to rebuild the public's confidence in the electoral process.

Hasen, the author of a new book titled "A Real Right to Vote," shared how the right to vote is absent from our Constitution and how this can be changed to enshrine our voting rights. **Dr. Claire Abernathy** and **Dr. Lauren Balasco** co-chair the Constitution Day Committee.

Election Debates & Candidate Forums

The Hughes Center and the Press of Atlantic City co-hosted the U.S. Congressional District 2 Debate for New Jersey. **Congressman Jeff Van Drew**, the Republican candidate and eventual winner, went head to head with Democratic challenger **Joe Salerno**, an entrepreneur. The debate covered topics important to voters in the district, including energy costs and offshore wind, climate change, abortion rights, the economy, healthcare, immigration, higher education costs, senior programs, and more.



U.S. Senate Candidate Forums

The Hughes Center also partnered with the Stockton chapters of College Democrats and College Republicans to host candidate forums for the major party candidates in the United States Senate race for New Jersey. Club members were able to develop questions they wanted to ask of their respective candidates and the forums were open to all Stockton students.




The forum with now **Senator-elect Andy Kim**, was moderated by the president of Stockton College Democrats, **Ryan Kilpatrick**. Kilpatrick, a senior majoring in political science, said “as a future social studies educator, being able to discuss the Congressman’s plans and ideas for New Jersey K-12 public schools was the highlight of the event for me.” Kim encouraged students in the audience to get engaged. “The opposite of democracy is apathy,” he said.

During the forum with **Curtis Bashaw**, a Cape May entrepreneur and the Republican candidate, questions were posed by the chairman of Stockton College Republicans, **Matthew Moore**, a junior majoring in Business Analytics. ‘The acrimony in our politics has been unsettling,’ said Bashaw. Asked why he joined the race, he said “We need to have a practical approach with people that want to work with everybody, around division, to get things done.”

Campus Events & Student Engagement

The Hughes Public Policy Center is committed to a vibrant culture of civic and political engagement on campus and in the community! The Hughes Center was an exhibitor at Stockton's [Coast Day](#) where high school students from the region get an opportunity to learn about coastal change, conservation, and resiliency. Hughes

Center staffer **Darya Hrybava** worked with students on art projects using shells she hand-collected and promoted the center's work around energy policy and offshore wind.

This semester also featured a post-election panel discussion with **Political Science** faculty **Dr. Claire Abernathy**, **Dr. James (Mac) Avery**, **Dr. Lauren Balasco**, **Dr. Michael Rodriguez**, and **Dr. Tina Zapple**.

They spoke about how most election models generated by political scientists accurately predicted the outcome based on tried-and-true variables like the economy, the constraints on any U.S. president such as institutional rules or partisan dynamics in Congress and bureaucratic inertia, and how our election fits within global trends of waning support for representative democracy and the rise of populism.



The Hughes Public Policy Center hosted and moderated an event in Stockton's new *Peaceful Pathways Forward Series* on "An Interfaith Perspective: Bridging Divides and Building Community in the Face of Conflict" in November. We asked spiritual leaders from our community to share their thoughts on sensitive issues like extremism within their own faith, security for their places of worship, and more.

Rear Admiral Kevin M. Sweeney, member of the Hughes Center Advisory Board, mentored a small group of Stockton students who participated in the one-day **WMGIC x NATO Countering Disinformation Challenge**. Both teams received high marks for their action plans for how NATO governments can better work with private social media companies to slow down the rapid spread of misinformation that may threaten national security.



Darya Hrybava gave a lecture "The State of Affairs in Belarus Since the 2020 Unrest" for the **Global Studies Minor**'s Global Affairs lecture series. The talk was a follow-up to a panel discussion about state-sponsored violence in Belarus the center organized back in 2020.

Dr. Tina Zapple and **Dr. Lauren Balasco** hosted students at biweekly webinars with experts sponsored by **Council on Foreign Relations (CFR) Education**, where they learned about international trade, climate change negotiations, human rights law, and more. Surprise guests included Paul Wolfowitz, former President of the World Bank, Deputy Secretary of Defense, and U.S. Ambassador to Indonesia.


About the Hughes Center
