Results from Southern New Jersey poll

Methodology

Zogby International was commissioned by Richard Stockton College to conduct a telephone survey of likely voters in Southern New Jersey (Legislative Districts 1-4, and 9).

The sample is 601 interviews with approximately 20 questions asked from 9/14/09 to 9/15/09. Samples are randomly drawn from purchased lists of registered voters. Zogby International surveys employ sampling strategies in which selection probabilities are proportional to population size within area codes and exchanges. Up to are made to reach a sampled phone number. Cooperation rates are calculated using one of AAPOR's approved methodologies¹ and are comparable to other professional public-opinion surveys conducted using similar sampling strategies.² Weighting by *district*, *age*, *race and gender* is used to adjust for non-response. Margin of error is +/- 4.1 percentage points. Margins of error are higher in sub-groups.

Narrative Summary

4. If the election for governor was held today and the candidates were Republican Chris Christie, Democrat Jon Corzine, and independent Christopher Daggett for whom would you vote?

Christie leads Corzine by seven percentage points at this point, but a fifth are unsure who they would for. Christie's greatest support lies in the 9th Legislative district (46%), while Corzine

does best in the 1st and 4th LDs (36% each). Men favor Christie over Corzine (41% to 26%) while women are split in their support (34% Corzine to 33% Christie). Of the age cohorts, Christie does best with 50-64 year-olds (41%) while Corzine gets most of his support from seniors (35%).

5. The lieutenant governor candidates are Republican Kim Guadagno, Democrat Loretta Weinberg, and independent Frank Esposito. On a scale of one to five with one being no impact at all and five being a huge impact how much of an impact does the lieutenant governor's race have on you vote for governor?

The lieutenant governor's race has slightly more of an impact on those in the 2^{nd} Legislative District (22%) than it does on those in the 1^{st} (18%), 3^{rd} (16%), 4^{th} (12%), and 9^{th} (6%). It also has a bit more of an impact on Democrats (17%) and Republicans (15%) than independents (11%).

All of the subgroups chose taxes and jobs/economy as their top two issues facing New Jersey today, but those in the 2^{nd} (77%) and 4^{th} (75%) LDs are the most adamant that taxes are the biggest issue, while those in the 2^{nd} (42%) and 9^{th} (43%) felt more strongly about jobs and the economy than the other districts. Republicans (75%) are more likely than Democrats (61%) and independents (66%) to think that taxes are the top issue.

Those in the 3^{rd} (30%) and 9^{th} LDs (27%) are more likely than those in the 4^{th} (19%), 2^{nd} (21%) and 1^{st} (20%) to say that political/government corruption is a top issue in the state, as are

independents (27%) and Republicans (26%) vs. Democrats (19%), and men (26%) vs. women (21%).

- 12. On a scale of one to five, with one being no influence at all and five being a huge influence, how much do negative campaign ads influence who you vote for?
- 13. On a scale of one to five, with one being no influence at all and five being a huge influence, how much do allegations of political corruption influence who you vote for?

Those in the 2nd (29%) and 3rd (23%) LDs are more likely than those in the 9th (16%), 1st (16%) and 4th (11%) to say that negative campaign ads influence their vote, as are independents (23%) compared to Democrats (19%) and Republicans (16%); and 50-64 year-olds (23%) vs. 30-49 year-olds (19%) vs. and those over 65 (17%).

Those in the 2nd (46%) and 9th (43%) LDs are more likely than those in the 1st (39%), 3rd (37%), and 4th (25%) LDs to say that political corruption allegations influence their vote, as are those over 65 (43%) compared to 30-49 year-olds (35%) and 50-64 year-olds (34%).
