## 1999-00 Annualized' Headcount \& FTE

- Total Population: The combined annualized headcount is a record 6143 students. FTE generated was a record 5058, exceeding last year's record by $2 \%$.
- Undergraduate: The 1999-00 annualized headcount for undergraduate students is $\mathbf{5 8 1 2}$ students, a slight increase since Spring 1999.
- Graduate: The graduate annualized headcount is a record 331 students, an increase of $\mathbf{2 4 \%}$ for FY99-00. A record 190 FTE was generated, which represents a 43\% increase over Spring 1999.


## Spring 2000 New Students

- Undergraduate: The 478 new undergraduates who registered this semester include 23 first-time freshmen, 390 transfer students, and 65 readmitted students.
- Graduate: Thirty (30) new students enrolled in four of Stockton's six graduate programs.


## Spring 2000 Enrollment

- Headcount \& FTE

Total Population: There are a record 5985 students registered, generating a record FTE of 4936.
Undergraduate: The 5648 undergraduates enrolled this semester represent $1 \%$ fewer than last year, which coincides with a record number of winter graduates. The corresponding FTE is 4736.
Graduate: Graduate student enrollment experienced a $\mathbf{2 3} \%$ increase, from 274 to a record 337 since last spring.
FTE figures broke 200 for an increase of $\mathbf{4 4 \%}$.

- Matriculated vs. Non-matriculated Students: The percentage of matriculated undergraduate students remains stable at $95 \%$ for undergraduates, and continues to increase for graduate students.

■ Credit load: Undergraduates maintained their average of 13.4 credits this semester, while graduate students increased their average credit loan from 6.1 to 7.1 .
