**Galloway Township, NJ-** The Richard Stockton College of New Jersey's Sara and Sam Schoffer Holocaust Resource Center was awarded a Humanities Festival Grant to host a seminar, "Reflections on Justice: Eleanor Roosevelt and the Creation of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights." The Humanities Festival Grant is from the New Jersey Council for the Humanities, a state partner for the National Endowment for the Humanities. Additional funding is from the New Jersey Commission on Holocaust Education.

This free and open to the public seminar is for community members, educators grades 4–12 and students (middle, high school and college). The seminar will be held on **Thursday, October 21, 2010** from 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. at the Sara and Sam Schoffer Holocaust Resource Center located on Stockton's campus in Pomona, NJ.

The two-hour seminar will introduce how Eleanor Roosevelt was prepared for her leading role in the creation of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The key themes of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights will be explored. The participants will be able to reflect on how justice was introduced through the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The principles of how justice relates to human rights and the strategies used to promote equality and preservation of freedom for all will be discussed.
