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# Stockton University, Atlantic Cape Community College Announce New Transfer Partnership

Stockton University President Harvey Kesselman and Atlantic Cape Community College President Barbara Gaba on Sept. 29 announced a new partnership that will help students make a smooth transition from the two-year-college to a four-year bachelor's degree program.

The "Stockton University at Atlantic Cape" program enhances existing agreements, and will provide students with more opportunities to earn both associate and bachelor's degrees.

"This partnership will strengthen our Atlantic City presence with Stockton University and will benefit students by providing a cost-effective means for them to get their degree and prepare for the workforce," Gaba said during a ceremony at Atlantic Cape's Charles D. Worthington Atlantic City Campus.

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Stockton welcomed 988 transfer students this fall, and 208 of them – more than 20 percent – came from Atlantic Cape Community College.

"We want to provide every student who wants it, the opportunity to earn a four-year college degree," Kesselman said. "This agreement will make it easier and more affordable for local students to continue their education, especially as we open our new Atlantic City campus in the fall of 2018."
