#### **Topics:**

#### • Critical Cultural Studies

Exploring ways to broaden the scope of the humanities and creating a wider critical canvas through cultural studies. Examining critical perspectives on academic disciplines; how traditional disciplines remain constant or must respond to changes in humans' relationships to each other, to society, technology, and the environment. Considering ways of knowing, shifts in conceptual frameworks and research methodologies. Proposing new directions for humanities studies.

- <u>Communication and Linguistics Studies</u>
   Examining the forms and effects of human representation and communication.
- <u>Literary Humanities</u>

Analyses of literatures and literary practices, to stabilize bodies of work in traditions and genres, or to unsettle received expressive forms and cultural contents. Examining changes over time in conceptual frameworks, ways of knowing, and ways of seeing.

- <u>Civic, Political, and Community Studies</u>
  Social studies in the humanities, where the humanities meet the 'social sciences'. Affinities and affiliations and their impacts on relationships within and across cultures. Issues of policy, governance, and controls over populations within and across nations. The human condition in an era of globalization.
- Humanities Education

On theories and practices of teaching and learning in the disciplines of the humanities and humanistic social sciences. General and subjectspecific pedagogy.

## Congressional Fellowship Program for Political Scientists

**American Political Science Association (APSA)** 

**Deadline:** December 3, 2019

**Amount:** \$52,500

Recipients of the APSA Congressional Fellowship receive a stipend of \$52,500, plus a small travel allowance. In addition, APSA will cover the cost of tuition for Fellows selected to take the class on Congress and Foreign Policy.

Congressional Fellows who are also selected for a fellowship through the Steiger Fund will receive a stipend for the duration of the Steiger Fellowship. The program lasts nine months, beginning in November and ending in mid-August.

**Abstract:** The American Political Science Association's Congressional Fellowship Program is a highly selective, nonpartisan program devoted to expanding knowledge and awareness of Congress.

Fellows spend the month of November in an intensive orientation where they participate in daily seminars with policy specialists, congressional staffers, scholars, and journalists. After orientation Fellows work in a personal office or committee staff within Congress. Fellows secure their own placements, with guidance from Congressional Fellowship Program staff, by interviewing with the congressional offices of their choice.

Two optional programs precede the main fellowship program: a two-month course on Congress and Foreign Policy, taught at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, and a fellowship through the William A. Steiger Fund to spend up to two months at the APSA Centennial Center carrying out a project in legislative studies.
