The purpose of this project is to end bird-window collisions in two high impact regions, the K-Wing breezeway on the Galloway campus and a section of windows in the quad space enclosed by the Residential Building on the Atlantic City campus, using artwork. Nature-inspired artwork, designed by Stockton 's own talented artists, can be printed on perforated vinyl and adhered to the outside window panes. The art is only visible from the outside to people and birds, and those inside have an unobstructed view. Birds will not fly into a mural that serves to prevent reflections. An example of this concept already exists on the Galloway campus in the form of advertisements displayed on the stairwells promoting the Atlantic City campus. The art awareness project takes this concept further by using art to save the birds and to educate the community on a conservation issue.

Introduction/Background:

Unsuspecting birds in flight see open sky, forest or beach as they approach expanses of windows on Stockton's Galloway and Atlantic City campuses. Completely unaware that they are about to strike a hard surface—fooled by life-like reflections in the glass—they don't slow down, make a hard bank or even close their eyes.

Some fall to the ground after an instant death while others gasp for their last breaths. The luckiest ones are found stunned sitting next to windows and picked up by caring hands of observant passersby and delivered to Lower F-Wing to John Rokita, principal lab technician, for rehabilitation.

A 2014 <u>study</u> published by BioOne estimates that 100 million to 1 billion birds are killed annually in the United States by building collisions. The only deadlier threat to birds is free roaming cats.

No one is more familiar with the bird-window collision problem on campus than John Rokita, a 1978 Biology graduate who has worked in Stockton's Animal Lab for four decades. As a student, he monitored the campus to quantify these collisions with Lester Block, also a Stockton graduate who works in the School of Natural Sciences and Mathematics. As an employee, Rokita has likely rehabilitated thousands of specimens and has kept meticulous records on the 851 deceased birds he's reported to the U.S. Geological Survey from 1979 through 2018.

The solution to this problem is an art awareness installation. Nature-inspired artwork, designed by Stockton's own talented artists, can be printed on perforated vinyl and adhered to the outside window panes. The art is only visible from the outside to people and birds, and those inside have an unobstructed view. Birds will not fly into a mural that serves to prevent reflections.

An example of this concept already exists on the Galloway campus in the form of advertisements displayed on the stairwells promoting the Atlantic City campus. The art awareness project takes this concept further by using art to save the birds and to educate the community on a conservation issue.

Haunted by the sound of death, Jacob Feige, associate professor of Art, has been already tested the effectiveness of window art on the Galloway campus. "Every October I brace for the thud of south-bound birds on the north-facing windows of the painting studio at Stockton. I regularly cut bird shapes out of black paper and tape them to the windows. It has significantly decreased the number of dead birds on the outer window sills during the fall migration," he explained.

This 2020 proposal seeks to consolidate the work of many across disciplines to end a long-term problem of bird-window strikes on campus.

Purpose/Goal:

The purpose of this project is to end bird-window collisions in two high impact regions, the K-Wing breezeway on the Galloway campus and a section of windows in the quad space enclosed by the Residential Building on the Atlantic City campus, using artwork.

The bird-window collision problem on the Atlantic City campus was brought to the attention of the Facilities Office just prior to Alice Sikora, of Institutional Research, and Susan Allen, of University Relations and Marketing, making a presentation to the Biodiversity Committee on December 12, 2018.

In Atlantic City, birds are dying, falling into the flower beds and attracting raccoons, which has resulted in an unwanted ecosystem in a residential space. Window art can end this problem.

Sikora and Allen pitched the idea of window art to the Biodiversity Committee and it was well received among the faculty, staff and administrators.

Activities:

Alice Sikora has turned John Rokita's 150-sheet notebook into a digital database detailing window strikes on campus, which has revealed peak months for window collisions (October and November), high impact areas and total kills per year.

Jacob Feige, associate professor of Art, is working with a student taking an independent study on designing artwork for the K-Wing Breezeway.

Our Graphics staff can also be called upon to create additional concepts and designs for the Galloway and Atlantic City campuses.

Susan Allen has obtained architectural drawings with dimensions of the Atlantic City Residential Building breezeway and Galloway's K-Wing Breezeway. The dimensions were submitted to Gotham Group and Feather Friendly Technologies for price quotes. Gotham Group is a local company that Stockton has worked with on all previous film installations.

If the project is funded, Susan Allen would pitch the story to local media and specialized publications like NJ Audubon Magazine, National Audubon Society's Magazine, ABC Birds, and other outlets. Internal publicity would include social media coverage, a short film documenting the installation and a story for the website and Stockton News.

Outcomes/Assessments:

The database created by Alice Sikora will continue to be updated, and a reduction in bird-window collisions will illustrate the success of the project.

The window-art will serve as an educational mural visible to the campus community and visitors, and will put Stockton University in a position to serve as a role-model for others ready to take

the steps to make their buildings more bird friendly. The design will include text that explains the purpose of the art in eliminating bird strikes.

If passed, the <u>Federal Bird-Safe Buildings Act</u>, sponsored by Senator Cory Booker, would require public buildings being constructed to follow standards minimizing glass or employing glass elements that would preclude collisions.

Window art has proved to be successful across the country. Stockton graduate Christopher Deets '99, 00' works at the National Migratory Bird Program's headquarters in Virginia and provided Stockton with a guidance document created by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service with best practices to follow. Atlantic Cape Community College, the University of Manitoba and buildings in Philadelphia are just a few successful projects that have preceded Stockton's efforts to make a difference.

Stockton's earliest study of bird-window collisions was published by Jeffrey Sherman for Professor Mark Pokras in 1978. His recommendations called for window decals in K-Wing four decades ago. We believe that the time has come to make art speak to the birds on Stockton University's pinelands and beachfront campuses.

 Total \$43,055.84

However, Don indicated the Facilities & Operations division wants to test the concept on the Galloway campus first before making a commitment to the Atlantic City campus. In addition: if Galloway is successful, future funding for AC would come directly from Facilities & Operations versus the 2020 initiative fund.

As a result, Jess and I are ready to have your proposal resubmitted to the 2020 Steering Committee with a budget-request modification (reduction) from \$43,055.84 to \$17,837.60.
